Track Progress

As of May 10th, the track project is on schedule with where the track builder anticipated it to be. Dirt work began and progressed at a very good rate with excellent weather to work in. Approximately 3 weeks ago, the rain started in and has slowed progress dramatically. The contractor was within two weeks of having the interior dirt work, crowning, interior drains, top end berm, and swale completed. Unfortunately, it has been too wet to work on any of these projects. Because of the excellent dry start, we are about where we thought we would be at this point. If the rains continue, progress will be slowed.

The next step in the project is putting in interior drains on the track as well as the berm at the top end to divert drainage from the hill. After this is completed, the interior dirt work and crowning will be completed. The asphalt paver has been tentatively scheduled for later in the summer. When that is complete, the rubber compound for the surface will be installed. The last work on the project will be the striping and marking of the track. The project is still scheduled to be completed in early September unless weather causes further delays this summer.

 - Students must also exhibit good citizenship and conduct as established in the Excelsior Springs student handbook AND maintain a grade of 3.0 or higher on the Employability Grade.
 - Students must pass program Technical Skills Attainment (TSA) by meeting or exceeding the assessment's national average.
 - Health Services/EMT-B/Fire Fighter I & II/Fire Science students must complete 525 hours of training including 100 hours of internship in a clinical setting.
